Joy プログラム紹介記事

こんにちは、今回は、自分の経験をふまえて JOY 生のコースについて、簡単に紹介したいと思う。

一般的に、横浜国立大学に交換留学をする交換留学生は、全員が JOY プログラムに編入される(個別な交換協定除く)。JOY 生の授業は、単位や内容において特徴はいくつがある。

1、講義の単位について

JOY 生として、学期ごとには少なくとも **14** 単位(**2** 単位の必修科目 Japan In The World を含む)の授業を履修しなければならない。学期末には修了に必要な単位に達しない場合、JOYプログラムの卒業証明書が獲得できない。

2、講義の内容について

講義の内容は主に日本語コース、JOY コースと学部コース、三つの方向を分ける。

日本語コースは、最初の日本語テスト成績によって、100 から 600 まで 六つの段階のコースを設置する。学生は自分の成績とマッチングのコース を選択するのは勧められる。また、日本語コースは 1 時限ごとに 1 単位し か得ない(日本語コース以外のコースは 2 単位)。日本語コース履修の最大 限は 6 単位で、最低限はない(全く履修しなくても OK)。

JOY コースは主に英語で授業を進めるコース。日本語で授業し、日本語中級以上の能力を要求するコースもある。JOY コースの授業内容がかなり広く、日本の伝統楽器からグローバル化研究まで色々がある。JOY コースは、留学生しか履修できないわけでなく、日本人の学生と一緒に授業を受けるコースも多い。

学部コースは各学部が学部生のために開設する講義だった。主に学部共通コースと専攻の専門コースを含む。このコースを履修したい場合、担当教員の許可が必要となる。

自分自身の経験から言えば、JLPT N2 以上の日本語能力を持ち、英語と日本語の能力をいっそう向上したい人は、三つ方面のコースを偏らないように履修することがお勧めする。日本語コースでは自分の日本語が向上でき

る。そして、JOY コースでは英語の会話力とコミュニケーション能力が向上できる。しかし、学部コースが日本語能力と専門知識を両方とも向上できるが、慎重に選択することが勧める。講義の担当教師や他の学生は、外国人との付き合う経験が少ない。一方、留学生の日本語能力も不十分だった。そのため、授業のルールや宿題の要求について留学生がはっきりと把握できず、誤解を招くことがあるかもしれない。

最後ですが、交換留学の日々に一番重要なことは、授業に興味を持って 楽しむことだと思う。

My Joy Program

Studying Japanese Language and culture for two years, I had the chance to be part of the JOY program of the YNU for two semesters. It was for me a very good experience.

First, the vast YNU campus is somewhat isolated, but it is not a problem as there is libraries, shops and numerous college restaurants within the campus. There is a lot of nature, and the calm is very appreciated.

Japanese classes were sometimes challenging but I learnt a lot thanks to them. When I first came to Japan, I couldn't speak well even if my written skills were decent. Thanks to the classes and the opportunities I had to meet and befriend Japanese people, I am now able to write and talk in Japanese about both everyday and more specific topics.

The other classes I took were related to linguistics or Japanese culture (although many courses are related to other disciplines such as business, engineering or urbanism). All of them were satisfying, and I learnt a lot about contemporary Japan thanks to them, studying history of colonization and immigration in Japan, subcultures and post-war cinema movements. More specifically, the "Japan in the World" course was a good opportunity for me to study in depth to disciplines I consider focusing in later, Lexicometry and Sociolinguistics.

Hello there!

I came from France to stay in Japan for 1 year thanks to the JOY Program.

I have already been in Japan for 1 month, it was in 2016 during May. I went as a worker and a tourist. But coming as an exchange student and living here make the experience definitely richer.

First of all, I use my Japanese language skills in my everyday life. If you don't talk, you read and if you don't read you talk in Japanese. There is no escaping from practicing because the brain will be still set on to try to figure out what the people are expressing. Fortunately, my major is Japanese and English so it made things easier to understand. Actually, some other exchange students came here without any knowledge beforehand. I was surprised because it never occurred to me that foreigner students could in fact enter a program that fits their major while starting studying Japanese. So some of them started last semester and they liked it. In the 300 level and 400 level the work was hard but the reward was even greater. I studied texts that touched directly our daily life in Japan and caught my attention. For example the konbini, shops that can be found at almost every 400 meters or less in cities. Working here in Japan 24h/7d and also displaying a broad large services: like ATM, body care products, large variety of food and beverage. Also texts explaining how the kaiten-zushi or sushi roll work, vending machines ...etc. Some shops that when you come to Japan you encounter directly and make life easier in various aspects.

When I had free time I like going to train in the gym nearby my dorm, it is really convenient because all kinds of sports are regrouped there. You enter the building, you can ask the officers there if you don't understand which sports are available, choose and pay for the ticket at the machine and go enjoy your time. I started soccer match session every Saturday night, it was small teams mixed in a tournament. I have a philosophy like you create better experience of friendship with others while facing hardships like physical efforts. This is how I got to know better some foreign students living in my dorm and also strengthen my bond with my girlfriend.

The place I like best is by far Minato Mirai, the harbor of Yokohama, walking there really make you feel good. Since there is the sea with big beautiful ships docked there, it is still Japan but it also gives you a feeling of travel, exploration, freedom. I always took the subway to go there but next time I plan to reach the harbor with my bicycle!

For that and for all other many experiences I got the chance to live, I think that the JOY Program can ensure the expectations of an open-minded and already alerted exchanged foreign student.
