

2019 Spring 1 semester From Faculty of Economics, Chulalongkorn University



After arriving at Narita airport I took the shuttle bus to YCAT. At Tokiwadai dormitory I paid rent for the first month plus a moving in deposit in cash. In this dormitory japanese students live together with exchange students. One of my japanese roommates helped me with buying articles of daily life and showed me how to use public transport etc. . A few days later we had an introduction ceremony where there were explanations of course selection and future events. On this day we did a placement test in japanese to determine which level of japanese courses would be appropriate to our current skills.

There was still a week before courses would start properly so I took the opportunity to view cherry blossoms in Shinjuku gyoen park. I went together with all of our roommates and the japanese roommates guided us there. Afterwards course work started up. During the semester there were activities planned by a group of japanese students who facilitated international exchange. Yokohama is well-located city if you want to visit different areas not only in the Tokyo metropolis but also other locations further away.
